# Taking the Sting Out of English 

Studentsenrolled in junior English quickly leamed that Mrs. Debbie McGinnis is not the common teacher. A self-described "hyperactive person." Along with the twenty- three different programs that are offered. students must also take English and social studies classes in order to receive their diplomas. Half their time is spent in class and the other half is spent in vocational labs.
