


Skaters On The Move




Kelly Coburn Represents PHS





Students who attended the 1989 prom will be sure to "Hold on to the Night" and all of the beautiful memories.







Exchange Students

In the 1988-89 school year, the exchange students were: Rodrigo Rocha (Rog), from Brazil; Per Flugstad, from Norway; Florian Nittscher, from Germany; and Bernadette Stone, from Mexico.

When asked about the differences between school in the U.S. and school in Brazil, Rog said, "At home, school is in the morning, and then there is a break, and then school begins again in the afternoon. School in Brazil is like college here." Rog plans to go to law school and later on become a diplomat.

This year in the U.S. was Per's first visit to the States. When asked about school here, Per said, "PHS is much more disciplined ... Norway is more like college." Per plans to go in the Army and then go to college to study business.





he TROJANS opened the season with a 27-18 win. Troy Parker led PHS with 237 yards on 22 carries and three touch-





After dumping your entire wardrobe onto your bedroom floor, you finally decide on your purple outfit (to match the new lipstick and nail polish, of course).


