
ADMINISTRATION BRINGING THE BURG THROUGH ANOTHER YEAR


Another important group at Wheelersburg High School is the Mixed Chorus. This group is made up of over half the students at the school. This group per-





The Spanish Club sponsored many fund-raisers throughout the year. Some of these activities included candy cane sales and Valentine computer matches. This group also made a spe-


cial overnight trip to Hamilton, Ohio to see the production of Don Quixote de la Mancha.

NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY


The National Honor Society is a prestigious group within Wheelersburg High School. The foundation of this group is leadership, scholarship, character, and service.


Cross Country team gains S.O.C. title.




Girls Second in S.O.C.
















Track And Field





























Room For Improvement




Tennis Team Serves Up to an Impressive Season
