


Winning Doors

Community Supports Issue

On December 16, 1981 the State Board of Education approved the bond issue for improvements on the Wheelersburg schools.

Wheelersburg proposed the bond issue in order that their schools could benefit from unused millage, instead of losing it to the state. The \$500,000 that Wheelersburg was allotted was to go toward school improvements in the Porter Township district. The issue went before the public on February 2, 1982 and passed by a surprising 81% margin with 892 votes for and 214 against. This is the first time that an issue of this type was ever proposed in Scioto County.


All of the money received must be used on capital improvements which include buildings or equipment with a life expectancy of at least five years. The improvements to be made include extensions on the art and music rooms at the elementary school plus some necessary roof repairs. At the high school there will be an entire new section added which will include a larger band room with a storage and physical fitness and training rooms.

Another new addition will be bu to replace the two metal Englis rooms beside the library. The adc tion will include two English room an art room, a drafting room, and computer lab. An extension will be made to the chemistry and physic room and the present art room wa be made into a science lab. The ar thitect chosen for this project in Gerald Pierron. He hopes to have the work nearing completion by the fall of the 1982-83 school year Thanks to the support of the community, Wheelersburg students will benefit greatly from this project.


Administration




Freshman Football Toughens Up



Golf Team Splits Season













Mixed Chorus Has Busy Year





Sadat's Assassination

The Falkland Crisis

The dispute between Argentina and Great Britain is a serious argument as to who should control the destiny of the Falkland Island.

Argentina has sent 4,000 men to the Falkland Islands, while Britain plans to capture the Falklands with 1,800 men. Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher of Great Britain demanded that Argentina withdraw all its troops before diplomats would take over, and Defense Secretary John Nott declared a 200 nautical mile war zone around the Falklands.

With Great Britain and Argentina as our allies the U.S. is in a difficult position. Through all the issues United States joined the U.N. Security Council majority demanding that Argentina withdraw its troops. Secretary of State Alexander Haig arranged peace talks between London and Buenos Aires. After six hours of talks he offered a first step in negotiating; if Britain called off its fleet, Argentina would withdraw its troops and negotiate with Britain. Haig spent almost eleven hours of talks with the Argentinians, then flew back to London with their proposal, but the British did not accept it. It seems now that Argentina has made a proposal to the U.S., if we are caught between any other allies that may be against Argentina, then we must fight on their side. Also Argentina has been receiving help from Russia and Cuba. Russia has been supplying information on the British fleet, by satellites, by 35 Soviet merchant ships, and by long range aircraft flying out of Angola and Cuba. The Argentines can only guess how long the British plan to press the battle.

Will Billy Graham Go to Moscow

Billy Graham has received an invitation to minister in Moscow. For over 40 years Graham has been preaching the Gospel in the United States as well as many other countries, but there has been one country he has never been allowed in. This country is the Soviet Union. The White House is worried that the Soviets are going to use Graham for propaganda purposes. Even though there are dangerous risks in the trip, Graham predicts he will go. The Egyptian President Anwar el-Sadat was assassinated October 6, 1982 while watching a military parade celebrating his 1973 surprise attack on Israel. A young lieutenant stepped from a truck and walked toward him. Sadat, expecting a salute, rose to his feet, and the officer tossed a grenade, while many other officers opened fire. Sadat and at least six others died during the shooting. His assassination left the Middle East in a difficult political position.

Controversy With Libya

Although there is a war of words between the United States and Libya, there are still strong commercial ties between the two countries. American exports have jumped by 20 percent this year. The U.S. is not only selling Libya such things as toys, tobacco, etc., but oil-field drilling equipment. Libya has stocked up on sophisticated American technology that is believed being converted to Muammar Kaddafe's Soviet Military. Not only do we trade with Libya, but there are many American oil corporations involved with Libya's oil fields.

The administration may soon bar Libya from buying sophisticated equipment as the U.S. did with Russia. With this decision it could mean Libya may send them somewhere else to buy such goods. Only Libya can decide exactly who to negotiate with.

The Columbia Takeoff

The space shuttle, Columbia, had a successful take-off. For the first time, a space-shuttle mission began on the day it was supposed to only an hour behind schedule. Columbia has been used twice with almost 2 million miles on it before the last flight. The only complication aboard the shuttle was the mechanical arm that failed. With a pair of binoculars, the astronauts were able to control the arm with its elbow. The main job for the arm was to take pictures in space. All experiments went as expected.

El Salvadore

It seems like over many years communism has been growing or wanting more power. One example is in El Salvadore. This is another dispute between two governments wanting more power. The real controversy is between the guerrillas and Christian democrats, to who will control the government. The peasants want to keep their socialist government while guerrillas refuse. The guerrillas are backed by Moscow and Cuba's Castro, they supply them with money, weapons, and more.

So far this year, the United States has sent the government of Jose Napoleon Duarte \$35 million in military aid, \$126.5 million in economic aid, and 51 military advisors. A Washington Post news poll showed that 72% of Americans want no more military aid sent to El Salvadore and more than 20,000 people marched on Washington to protest the Administrations stand in Central America. Secretary Haig told Walters to tell Castro that Cuba could expect better relations if it would stop aiding revolutionaries but Castro told Walters that he would not consider withdrawing his support for the guerrillas. Until these countries start negotiating more seriously this war will lead to nowhere.

Liz Taylor

The reconciliation of Elizabeth Taylor Hilton Wilding Todd Fisher Burton Burton Warner and longtime flame Richard Burton, occured in February for Elizabeth's 50th birthday party.

Burton called Liz on the morning of her birthday, February 27th, to get permission to attend her private party in London.

It was the first reunion for the couple in more than five years.

Princess Diana 'Lady Di'

Just two months after the royal wedding, Prince Charles and Princess Diana announced that the newlywed Diana is expecting to deliver sometime in early June. Just 11 months after the July 29th wedding.

The child will be second in line to the throne, after Prince Charles, putting aside his brother Andrew.

The most likely names for the child in case of a boy are George, Philip (In honor of Charles' father) Edward, and Louis (in honor of Charles favorite uncle, the late Lord Mountabatten). For a girl the most likely names are Elizabeth and Francis for the parents mothers.



During his press conference he described his captivity as "just a small sacrifice for freedom."
