The inspiration for this great feat came from Eric Wallace who was injured in the final game of the regular season. ## State Champs What a Way to End a Perfect Season!

The Wheelersburg Pirates football team had an advantage during the state championship game at the Ohio Stadium. The Pirates had twelve men on the field instead of the standard eleven. That extra man was teammate Eric Wallace, injured during the last regular season game. Every Pirate player carried Eric in his thoughts as the team won yet another one for Eric, themselves, and the community. This was the final one, thus giving Wheelersburg its first state high school football championship title in Division IV.
Winning the state title was something "special" and it indeed was something "special" as the Pirates unfurled a play just for Warren John F. Kennedy. The Pirates had a name for the play; they called it "special." It proved to be a winner as the Pirates came away with a 14-7 championship.
Shortly after time had run out in the 14-7 win and following the initial celebrating on the field, the Pirates went to the south end of the famed horseshoe. As the cheerleaders unveiled a "Told you so, Eric" banner, all eyes were on Eric's vantage point high in a private press box. Then before leaving the field, the team gathered at mid-field for a prayer. They had finished their mission, for themselves and their friend.
Looking back over their way to the state, the Pirates escaped an upset in the first playoff game as they battled the Brookville Blue Devils to a 20-14 semifinal win. In the Division IV, Region 16 championship game against Coal Grove, the Pirates came up with the two big defensive plays when they had to in gaining a 28-26 victory. That night also saw senior Chris Risner haul in a 69 -yard scoring pass from Matt Miller and return punts and kicks to the tune of over 300 yards total.
One might say that Pete Ruby "kicked" the Pirates into the state championship game as his 36 -yard field goal the first he had ever attempted - with 3:12 left in the third quarter lifted the Burg to a 15-7 win over Versailles for a berth in the state title game. It was revenge for the Pirates, who had been eliminated from the playoffs in each of the last two seasons by Versailles.
What a great way to end a perfect 14-0 winning season. On November 25, 1989, at Ohio Stadium on The Ohio State University campus, the Pirates made their dream come true before nearly 8,000 fans. The weather was perfect, the game was perfect, the whole evening was perfect as the Wheelersburg Pirates defeated the Warren John F. Kennedy Fighting Eagles and claimed the title of Division IV State Champs.

## This One's For You Eric!

On October 27, 1989, in the final game of the regular season, Eric Wallace, \#36, was taken by helicopter to Grant Hospital in Columbus after receiving a serious head injury in the Wheelersburg vs. Washington Court House game. Eric, playing defensive cornerback in the third quarter, was injured when he made a hit on a Court House player. He was slightly stunned at the time, got up and came over to the sidelines, and just as he got to the bench, he collapsed. Surgery was performed to relieve pressure on Eric's brain that night and he was listed in serious condition in the intensive care unit the following morning.
We will never forget that night nor the many weeks to follow.
It was not a quick recovery for Eric but he showed gradual improvement each day. After three weeks in Grant, he was transferred to Dodd Hall where he underwent daily therapy sessions. On November 25, Eric was allowed to go to the Ohio Stadium to watch the Pirates win the state championship, for not only themselves, but for him.
Eric's story was nationally broadcast by Paul Harvey, based in Chicago. The broadcast told of Eric's fight to recover and of the Pirates' march to the state championship with Eric serving as inspiration.
Finally on January 12, 1990, Eric returned home for good and soon began to attend three of his classes each day. Throughout all the time and all the emotions felt by each one of us, it can probably best be summarized by the final closing words of the Paul Harvey broadcast when he said, "Nothing, ever again, will be impossible in Wheelersburg, Ohio."
This one's for you Eric!
On September 29, 1989, during the homecoming game against Valley, Eric stops to put on his shoe before attempting the extra-point kick.

During his long recovery, Eric achieves one of his goals, that of graduating with his classmates, as he gives Mr. Parker a final handshake and hug before he receives his diploma.

"It was the luck of the Irish," is how Coach Carol Bialkowski described her team's three-fourths of a point win over Northwest in the SOC track and field championships held at the Burg. The 1,600 relay team of Amy Spriggs, Carrie McCarty, Kerry Cremeans, and Kathie Wheeler romped to a meet-record time of $4: 16.7$ surpassing the old mark of $4: 17.9$ set in 1988 by Valley. When the dust settled and the final points were totaled the Burg had 106 points and Northwest had 105 1/4 in the Division II race. At the Division III district meet, the Lady Pirates had the team title safely tucked away and won the 1,600 relay with a clocking of $4: 19$. After a protest was lodged, officials ruled the race had to be run again and the Lady Pirates went out and won it again this time improving their time to $4: 15$. At the regional meet in Cambridge, junior Kathie Wheeler qualified for the state meet by winning the high jump at 5-2 in Division II. The Lady Pirates' 1,600 relay unit missed going to the state by one position by finishing fifth in 4:13.87. At the state, Kathie bettered her sixth place finish of last year by grabbing fifth clearing 5-2.

## Art Department Receives \$50,000 Grant

One of the highlights of the second semester in the art department was the awarding of a $\$ 50,000$ grant to Mr. Tom Suter to benefit visually gifted secondary computer art students for a project he calls "Computer Art Awareness." Only 13 grants were awarded from more than 200 applications received statewide by the Division of Special Education, Ohio Department of Education. Melissa Bibbey, media specialist, worked with Mr. Suter on the grant program.
Mr. Suter was very pleased as this will allow Wheelersburg students to compete on a national level with computer art. The grant obtained the purchase of Macintosh II ox computers and a Hewlett Packard Paint Jet Color Printer. The computers are capable of computer animation and video overlay. This will allow the students to do self-portraits. Dow Chemical Inc., has agreed to let the students have access to the company's QMS Color Laser Printer, a $\$ 25,000$ piece of equipment.
This will be a great opportunity to expand Wheelersburg High School's art focus and has set the tradition of being the model project for other school districts in the state.
