## In Memory of Myron E. Martin

Myron Martin collaborated with Mr. Tom Suter in 1989 to form a business-school partnership utilizing video/art technology with Dow Chemical, Hanging Rock Plant. It was designed for the visually gifted secondary students which helped create the computer art program. In 1992, Mr. Martin helped our school system to earn the Pioneering Partner for Educational Technology award as he served as the Business Liason representing Dow Chemical. In 1993 he helped write the NEaTWORK grant for Wheelersburg Local Schools and served as the Business Representative on the technology team. Beginning in 1994, Mr. Martin served as the volunteer technology network manager for the school system.

Mr. Martin died of a heart attack on February 10, 1995. His wife, Mrs. Jackie Martin teaches fifth grade, his daughter Lori Suter teaches sixth grade, and his son-in-law Tom Suter teaches art in the Wheelersburg Local Schools system. His son David is a graduate of WHS and serves as a Lt. JG in the Navy. Mr. Martin's influence and dedication will be greatly missed by the entire district.

# Hometown Pride Stretching State-Wid 

Before the season even began, hopes were high for the 1994 Wheelersburg varsity football squad. Led by a phenomenal senior class that had enjoyed success as a team since junior high, the Pirates cruised to an 8-1 regular season record and a berth in the state semifinals. One of the most emotional games of the season was not a playoff game but rather a highly-anticipated, highly-publicized meeting with the Ironton Tigers. With crowds arriving as early as 5:00, the shaker-filled stadium rocked with the collective shouts of a standingroom only hometown crowd and the crunch of tackles on the field. Though the game ended in a disappointing 7-14 loss, it proved to be the impetus needed for the near-perfect remainder of the season as the Pirates trampled their opponents on their way to the state semi-final match.
Andy Blankenship, a wide-receiver tumed tailback who rushed for 1,273 yards in only half of the season, Jonathan Eaton, a suberb faker, lineman Rex Pyles, and defensive tackle Mack Wolfenbarker were only some of the standouts who combined to post impres-
sive season stats for the Pirates. ## Pirates Pump Their Arms

For the first time in well over a decade, both the boys' and girls' track teams at Wheelersburg High School established an SOC dynasty. Despite a controversial disqualification in the 3200 m run, the Pirates surged to victory led by seniors Jason Williams, Rex Pyles, Jonathan Eaton, and Chris Cogan. Outstanding performances exemplified the Pirate track season this year. From the consistent record-breaking throwing of Rex Pyles to the high-jumping, hurdling speed of Jonathan Eaton, the Pirates were one of the most complete teams in the state. This completeness showed itself in nearly every meet this season as well as in the district finals at Ironton where the Pirate men were run-away winners.

The WHS boys blew away the competition at the district championships, scoring in the field as well as in the running events. The Pirates had four top plac-ings-Chris Cogan in the 400 m dash, Rex Pyles in the discus and shot put, and the 1600 m relay team. Rex won first place in discus with a hurl of 172-6 on his final chance. That broke the district record which had been set by Gallipolis Gallia Academy's Burt Wood, who
eventually came in second. Jonathan Eaton came in second in the 110 m hurdles and in the 300 m hurdles. Jason Williams and Tyler Travis finished second and third in the 1600 , while Tyler place second in the 3200. Jerod Tilley qualified in the 300 m hurdles.

From regional finals, Rex Pyles and Jonathan Eaton qualified to earn a berth at the state meet. In Columbus, Rex took second-place finishes in both the shot put with a toss of $56.4^{1 / 4}$ and in the discus with a throw of 171-2. Jonathan competed in the long jump but failed to place.

Led by two-time state champion Becky Bamett, Jane Allwood, and other regional and district winners, the WHS girls' track team was off and running by the time the first meet came around. The goal of the year was to win the SOC meet, and win it they did. There was no doubt that the Lady Pirates were the finest team to take the track after a convincing 50-point win at the SOC's, a win in which the lady Pirates took first place in nearly every event.
According to SOC treasurer and veteran meet official Jim Smith, he has never seen a team with a finer set of runners than the 1995 Lady Pirates. In addition, they are the finest hurdle crew in Ohio, setting a record of 10 seconds flat.
At the Division II district championships at Ironton, the Lady Pirates placed second, two points behind Ironton. Becky Bamett led the WHS team, winning the long jump, 100 m hurdles, 400 m dash, and anchoring the 1600 m relay team to a first-place performance. Becky posted a new district record in the hurdles with a time of :14.8, breaking the old mark by over a second. Jane Allwood also had a good day, coming in first in both the 800 m and 1600 m runs. Amanda Mauk took a second place in the 300 m hurdles, ahead of a fourth
place finish by teammate Leigh Ann Ferguson. Heatr Deal also qualified in the high jump.

## Hitting the Books...Literally

Every day during their study halls, approximately twenty WHS students volunteered their time and energy to help our Media Specialist/Librarian, Mrs. Melissa Bibbey, run the library. There have been some major changes in the system, the main one being the full automation of the library. This year students were issued a library card from which their computer-scanned check-outs were recorded according to their student ID. Also, students had access to intemet and to Shawnee State University's library, an especially useful source for juniors and seniors working on their research papers.

# Wheelersburg High School Plans of the 1995 Graduates and Scholarships for 1995 

The Class of 1995 had a total of 108 graduates, 93 from the home school and 15 from the vocational school. Conceming the plans for the 1995 graduates, 85 plan to attend a four year college or university, 1 plans to attend a two-year college, 1 plans to attend private or adult schools, 2 plan to join the Armed Services, 18 plan to work, and 1 plans to become a housewife.

The Class of 1995 had 33 students to receive scholarship monies. Estimate of Scholarship Monies (academic, music, art, and athletic) awarded to 1995 graudates will approximate $\$ 213,800$ for one year and with the renewables each year, will approximate $\$ 764,600$ for four years of education. Estimate of Grants, Loans, and College Work Study Monies will approximate $\$ 50,000$.
